


This year Guiding reaches its centenary year. As part of their celebrations

1966

Why She Buys All Her Shoes From Bata

"My sister bought her first pair of Bata shoes before she was married—and that was 28 years ago. She has been buying Bata shoes ever since, and will not look at shoes from anywhere else."

This tribute was paid by Mrs. B. Sherry, scretary of Collier Row Catholic Wornen's Guild, when a party from the guild visited the British Bata factory on Wednesday.

"She swears by Bata shoes," added fra. Sherry, "and so do I. No other shoes, I am sure, would leave my feet so comfortable after walking nearly five miles into Romford, and back again in a net time of less than an hour. I do this quite frequently."

Mrs. Sherry said she received the same good value when she bought Bata shoes on the Continent, especially in Holland, where Bata shops seem to be most numerous.

The Romford store is the nearest Bata shop to Collier Row. Its popularity may be exemplified by the statement of several visitors that they get "lovely" shoes there.

Girls Club moved from Hostel No.1 to the Bata Social Centre on 18th May 1967. The average number of girls at a weekly meeting eight but during the year 1967/8 numbers increased to twenty on occasions. In 1968 whilst out playing rounders in the park, the girls were joined by friends and brothers who enjoyed the evening and asked if they could join. The girls agreed to officially open the club to the boys on 15th July 1969. In September 1969 the club enjoyed a trip to Southend.

During the following year numbers had increased to thirty-eight, after the Christmas break, unfortunately due to ill health of Mrs Howard the meetings did not resume until April 1971.

Decimal Day and new fees came into effect, juniors 2n.p and 3n.p for seniors. In September that same year only eleven members returned, but the following week numbers had increased to 19 and by October the club was back to thirty at the weekly meeting.

In 1972 the club made a blanket for Bennet Lodge, it was hoped that by being sponsored to make a square funds would be raised for an outing.

I July 1973 six children, Mrs Howard and Barbara went to St Mary's Bay Holiday Camp for a week. The weather was good and the accommodation better than ever. All enjoyed it and hope to go again next year. August 1973 16 members and four helpers went to Westcliff for the day.

August 1974 27 members and 7 helpers went to Walton-on-the-Naze, for a lovely day.

1976 meetings are now split as it was too hectic trying to put juniors and seniors together. 4 – 7yrs 6 – 7pm 3p 7 – 14yrs 7 – 8pm 5p. August trip to Walton-on-the-Naze. 1977 visit to Colchester Zoo

During the 1980s the club experienced some changes and some new faces. Sylvia left us and Julie joined as a helper. We no longer had separate junior and senior meetings and the club was open to children of school age up to age 10 and we had forty children registered on the books.

1993 and our Christmas party was games and buffet table. 26 members and 2 young helpers and Mrs Howard, Julie and Barbara, and we have a waiting list of 16 names.

1994 our book shows 37 members are registered this year, and in 1995 39 members are recorded.

In 1996 ten boys and twelve girls registered, but in 1997 only eighteen were recorded and only seven were girls. By 1998 we were very aware of the safe number ratio and this limited our club number to sixteen with two adult helpers. In 1999 our numbers dropped to thirteen but by the year 2000 we had grown again and as most of the children were older now we were able to go to nineteen.

The new millennium and we experienced a slow decline in numbers, we advertised in the local school paper and the following week had 34 children, but although they said they enjoyed the experience not all returned weekly. Many ideas were tried, but when it came down to it what we had to offer apparently appealed to some, but not all. This is

where a slow decline in interest has taken its toll. New members came along but without their need for team games, playing with skipping ropes or bats and balls, we began to loose numbers. Those that were loyal to us found they enjoyed a new experience, as that of being a member of a large family; we had opportunity to tackle more challenging home crafts and board games.

We were recipients of money from the Forum, which was spent on craft and new games equipment. Those who were with us were able to enjoy them all and now we have been able to pass on to other youth organisations all that we had amassed over the years.

Our last activity was to be rather grown up, considering our members young age, we went to the Ship Restaurant for a meal with the helpers. There were six children and four adults, all have been members of the Boys and Girls Club at some time in their lives and were still connected at its close on 12th July 2010. Do you remember being a member of this club, do you have memories to share?
